We cannot resume work until all unexploded ordnance is cleared. It's a death trap," he said. Army units, in coordination with Jammu and Kashmir Police, have evacuated high-risk zones and issued stern warnings to residents not to touch any suspicious ob-ierts or unexplored shells.

In one major operation, 42 live shells were safely destroyed in the Poonch villages of Jhulas, Salotri, Dharati and Salani. "All safety protocols were followed. Poonch saw the vast majority of deaths due to shelling. Beyond GDP: India's tryst with reforms

SABYASACHEE DASH

In a compelling conver-Montek Singh Ahluwalia, one of the key architects of India's 1991 economic reforms, has shared his insights on India's policy transformations, ongoing the road ahead. His reflections provide a rare glimpse into the behind thescenes decision-mak-ing that helped shape ing that helped shape modern India's economic trajectory. Ahluwalia began by recalling the economic turmoil India faced in 1991, marked by

a severe balance of pay-ments crisis. At the time, foreign exchange reserves had exchange reserves had dwindled to a precarious level, and a radical shift in economic policies was only way forward reforms that folthe The The reforms that fol-lowed, including trade liberalization, delicens-ing of industries, and opening up to foreign investment, were a water-shed moment in India's history. While the reforms were speacheadhistory. While the reforms were spearheaded by then Prime Minister P.V. Narasimha Minister P.V. Narasimha Rao and Finance Minister Dr. Manmohan Singh, Ahluwalia emphasized that their success lay in a collective effort. He dis-minord elaimet that the missed claims that the World Bank and IMF dic-World Bank and IMF dic-tated India's economic policies, clarifying that discussions on structural reforms had already been taking place within the government. The crisis merely acted as a cata-lyst, allowing long-pend-ing reforms to material-ize.

He also recounted how his policy paper, later dubbed the M Document. influenced the govern-ment's approach to eco-

nomic restructuring. He highlighted that resistance to change existed even within the bureaucracy, but strong leader-ship and a strategic approach helped push reforms forward. Shifting focus to current econom-ic challenges, Ahluwalia addressed India's fiscal addressed India's fiscal health, particularly the rising debt-to-GDP ratio. While India's public debt remains below that of many advanced economies, he cautioned that sustaining long-term growth requires a disci-plined fiscal policy. He plined fiscal policy. He pointed out that India needs to balance its social needs to balance its social spending with fiscal pru-dence. Excessive debt, if not managed well, can crowd out essential investments in infrastructure, education, and healthcare. He also discussed how

government borrowings impact private investment, suggesting that a measured fiscal deficit is crucial to ensuring macroeconomic stability. Ahluwalia reflected on Aniuwana reflected on the evolving global trade landscape, particularly the increasing protection-ism seen in the US and other developed

economies. While global-ization had initially benefited fited emerging economies like India, latest trends indicate a shift towards economic nationalism. He criticized the US's approach of imposing tariffs on allies and competitors alike, warning that such trans-actional policies create uncertainty in global trade. He stressed the need for India to remain need for india to remain engaged with internation-al markets while also building domestic com-petitiveness through trade reforms and strategic tar-

iff adjustments. On the subject of India's currency, Ahluwalia sup-ported a managed exchange rate rather than a completely free float. He argued that some level of rupee depreciation is beneficial for boosting exports and maintaining economic competitiveness. Countries like China and other East Asian economies had his-torically kept their cur-rencies weak to support exports, and India should take a pragmatic approach rather than aim-ing for an artificially strong rupee. A critical area of concern, accord-

ing to Ahluwalia, is India's human capital development. While India's human development. While India boasts a large young workforce, a sig-rificant portion lacks young workforce, a sig-nificant portion lacks employable skills. He pointed out the mismatch between the education system and industry needs, arguing that mere degree acquisition does not translate to employability.

He emphasized that states He emphasized that states must take a more proac-tive role in education reforms. While the Centre can provide a framework, execution Iranework, execution lies with state govern-ments. He also urged for better governance in edu-cational institutions and stronger linkages stronger linkages between academia and industry to bridge the industry to ordege the skill gap. Discussing cli-mate change, Ahluwalia acknowledged the grow-ing global pressure on India to reduce carbon emissions. While India has committed to achiev-ing net zero by 2070, he stressed that immediate policy actions are required. He advocated for accelerating the tran-sition from coal to renew-able energy while simul-taneously investing in climate-resilient agriculture. He warned that climate

He warned that climate change could significant-ly reduce agricultural productivity, underscor-ing the need for better water conservation, agri-cultural research, and sustainable farming prac-tices. He highlighted that some states, like Tamil Nadu, have begun work-ing on climate action nadu, nave begun work-ing on climate action plans, but a nationwide coordinated effort is nec-essary. He called for greater cooperation between the Centre and between the Centre and states, labeling climate adaptation as an opportu-nity for true "cooperative federalism." Addressing the growing culture of populist welfare schemac. Abluwelia cou populist welfare schemes, Ahluwalia cau-tioned against excessive reliance on government handouts. While targeted welfare policies are necwelfare policies are nec-essary, indiscriminate giveaways often come at the cost of long-term eco-nomic sustainability. He noted that fiscal discipline is essential to ensur-ing that social schemes do not compromise do not compromise essential investments in infrastructure and devel-opment. Political parties opment. Poincal parties across the spectrum, he argued, must rethink their approach to welfare to strike a balance between social security and economic prudence. Ahluwalia concluded by Ahluwalia concluded by emphasizing that eco-nomic reforms are not a one-time event but an ongoing process. The 1991 reforms laid the foundation for India's economic rise, but newer challenges demand fresh policy innovations. He stressed that India must continue improving its business climate, inte-grating with global mar-kets.

Whitening products may damage teeth

products -- that promise to make pur smile brighter --ay also be your may also be causing tooth damage, a study has found. Scientists

at Stockton University in the US found that hydrogen peroxide, the active ingredient in over-the-counter whitening strips, can damage the protein-rich dentin tissue found beneath the tooth's protective enamel. The tooth is enamel. The tooth is made of three layers: the outer tooth enam-el, an underlying dentin layer and con-nective tissue that binds the roots to the

gum. Most studies of whitening strips have focused on tooth enamel, which con-tains very little protein. The team focused

on dentin, which makes up most of the tooth and has high lev-



els of protein, most of which is collagen. It is well estab-lished that hydrogen peroxide can penetrate the enamel and dentin. Previous work by the researchers showed that collagen in the dentin layer decreased when teeth were treated with whitening strips. "We sought to fur-ther characterize what the hydrogen peroxide was doing to collagen. We used entire teeth for the studies and focused on the impact hydrogen peroxide has on the proteins," said Kelly Keenan, associ-ate professor at

demonstrated that the major protein in the dentin is converted to smaller fragments when treated with hydrogen peroxide. In additional experiments, they treated pure collagen with hydrogen perox-ide and then analysed ide and then analysed the protein using a gel electrophoresis laboraate professor at Stockton University.

Russia launches one of biggest drone assault on Ukraine, at least 1 killed

Kyiv, May 18: Russia overnight into Sunday launched one of its most intense drone attacks on Ukraine of its most intense drone attacks on Ukraine since the beginning of its full-scale invasion in 2022. Russia fired a total of 273 exploding since begaining for the full of 273 exploding dromes and decoys overnight, Ukraine's air force said. Of hose, 88 were intercepted and a further 128 lost, likely having been elec-tronically jammed. The attacks largeted the country's Kyiv, Dnipropetrovsk and Donetsk regions. According to data from Ukraine's air force, this would be the largest drone attack Russia has launched against Ukraine since the start of the war, but Ukrainian officials have not confirmed this. The number of drones fired exceeds Rus-sia's previous largest known single drone attack of the war, when Russia pounded Ukraine with 267 drones on the eve of the war's third anniversary.
