MHA writes to States, UTs to ensure special facilities for elderly prisoners

New Delhi: The Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) has written to all states and Union Territories (UTs) to make special provisions in prisons and correctional in-stitutions to ensure the safety, care, and well-being of elderly inmates. In an ad-visory visued on Ilul 1 the of elderly immates. In an advisory issued on July 1, the MHA highlighted that prison institutions across the country house several vulnerable immates, including senior citizens who often require additional assistance to manage their day-to-day activities in a custodial environment.

The advisory has been sent to the Chief Secretaries of all states and UTs, as well as, the Director General and Inspector General of Pris-ons and Correctional Ser-vices. Reiterating its com-mitment to the welfare of elderly citizens, the MHA emphasized the need for "specially accessible ac-commodations in prisons" to meet the physical needs to meet the physical needs

to meet the physical of aged inmates.

Srinagar, Jul 8: National Conference president Fa rooq Abdullah on Tuesday termed as "anti-Constitutional" the decision of the Election Commi sion to undertake special intensive revision of

sion to undertake special intensive revision of electoral rolls in poll-bound Bihar.
"More than 1.50 crore Biharis are working outside their state. How will they fill the form (for enrol-ment)? How will they vote? Where will they get the certificates for their deceased parents?" Abdul-ha sked. The former chief minister of Jammu and Kashmir was talking to reporters at Kulgam where he had gone to attend a party event.
"When the Constitution was framed by B R

Ambedkar, everyone had a right to vote. Then it was amended to give voting rights to 18 year olds and above. Today, they (ECI) has brought a new law which is against the Constitution. They are trying to please their master. To please their master. they are willing to sacrifice everything," he added. Abdullah said there was a need to wake up to these "machinations" as it was not acceptable to the peo-

ple of India. "Wake up! Regretfully, I say that it is not acceptable to people of India. If they push it through, then there will be an agitation to save the Constitution and it will be bigger than earlier agitation. May-lah grant them wisdom to safeguard the Constitution," he added. The Election Commission on June 24 issued instructions to carry out a special intensive revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar, apparatur to weed out in elicible names and ensure only ently to weed out ineligible names and ensure only eligible citizens are included in the electoral roll eligible citizens are included in the electoral roll. The last such revision in Bihar was conducted in 2003. According to the EC, the exercise was ne-cessitated by rapid urbanisation, frequent migra-tion, young citizens becoming eligible to vote, non-reporting of deaths, and inclusion of the names of foreign illegal immigrants. Elections in Bihar are due later this year.

Wildlife Clearance Not Mandatory For Basic Public Facilities Under

NEW DELHI, Jul 8: The Ministry of Tribal Affairs (MoTA) has written to the environment ministry califying that wildlife clearance is not automatically required for constructing essential public facilities such as schools, anganwadis and roads on forest land under the Forest Rights Act (FRA)- 2006, provided they are recommended by the Gram Sabha. In a office memorandum issued on July 2, MoTA offered advantaged extingation of the FRA. tites such as schools, roads, health centres and irriga-tion projects for the benefit of forest-dwelling Sched-uled Tribes and Other Traditional Forest Dwellers (OTFDs). "Section 3(2) of the FRA states that, notwithstanding anything contained in the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980, the Central government shall provide for diversion of forest land for facili-ties (including schools, health centers, roads, etc)... on forest land. E-Comm platforms, online payments services being abused for terror financing: FATF

New Delhi: Global terror financing watchdog FATFo n Tuesday cited the February 2019 Pulwama terror attack, which killed 40 CRPF personal, and the 2022 Gorakhnath Temple incident to say thate-commerce platforms and online payment services are being misused for terror financing. In its Comprehensive Update on Terrorist Tinancing Risks', the FATF also flagged 'state sponsorship of terrorism' and said a variery of publicly available sources of information and elegeations' inputs to phis report indidelegations' inputs to this report indi-cate that "certain terrorist organisations have been and continue to re ceive financial and other forms of support from several national govern-ments". "Delegations reported on this



trend by referring to the use of state sponsorship for TF (terror financing) either as fundatising etchique or as part of the financial management strategy of the certain organisations engaging in terrorist acts. Several

forms of support have been reported including direct financial support, lo gistical and material support, or the provision of training," the Financia

Schools In J&K Reopen After Summer Break

Srinagar, Jul 8: Schools in Jammu and Kashmir reopened on Tuesday after two weeks of summer vacation as heavy rains on Monday ended the prolonged heatwave in the valley. The schools opened amidst criti-cism of the government's decision to advance to the school timing to 7.30 am. The Jammu and Kashmir government on Monday decided against extending the summer vacations despite no signs of heatwave abat-ing in the valley. However, within couple of ing in the valley. However, within couple of hours of the announcement, heavy rains lashed the valley and the temperature came down to normal levels across Kashmir. Some parents were critical of the new schedule announced by Minister for Education Sakina Mascool Htoo. Several videos were posted online in which parents showed the difficulties faced by kids to wake up at 5.30 am in order to catch their school bus between 6.30 am and 7.00 am. The education minister said on X that institutions within the municipal limits in the valley will function from 7.30 am to 11.30 am, while in other areas, the timings will be from 8 amto 12 noon. "We are reopening schools from tomorrow (Tuesday) in Kashmir Division & Winter Zonse of Jammu Division," Ittoo & Winter Zonse of Jammu Division, "Ittoo Winter Townson Land Control of the Problem of the Winter Zonse of Jammu Division," Ittoo. & Winter Zones of Jammu Division," Ittoo said. The minister said the students will at-tend two online classes from home after a one-hour break, "After a 1-hour break, 2 online classes will follow. Teachers to remain available till 2 PM. The environment ministry letter had said that provisions of the Wildlife (Protection) Act, 1972, remain unaffected by

Section 3(2) of the FRA. However, the Tribal Affairs Ministry has now made it clear

However, the Tribal Affairs Ministry has now made it clear that Section 3(2) of the FRA is rooted in constitutional rights and safeguards, including Articles 14, 19(1)(e) and 21 of the Constitution, as well as the Fifth and Sixth Schedules, which protect tribal rights.

The ministry cited landmark Supreme Court judgments, including Samatha vs State of Andhra Pradesh (1997) and TN Godavarman Thirmumlyad vs Union of India (1997), to emphasise that the FRA is a legal instrument to balance tribal rights, development needs and environmental concerns.

The letter further said that the right to divert forest land under Section 3(2) must be read along with Sections 7(2) and 7(2

The letter further said that the right to divert forest land under Section 3(2) must be read along with Sections 2(e), 4(1), 4(2), and 4(7) of the FRA. These provisions affirm that for-strights are "vested" in tribal and forest-dwelling commu-nities to correct "historical injustices". Addressing concerns about potential conflicts with wildlife conservation, the ministry said, "Section 4(2) of the FRA specifies the permissible self limitation. It introduces the self-limiting exception, to the modification or resettlement of forest rights for wildlife conservation, only in Critical Wildlife Habitat."

Referring to a joint 2009 guideline with the environment ministry outlining procedures for forest land diversion for non-forest purposes under Section 3(2) of the FRA, MoTA said that the stipulated procedure provides a "clear understanding that the wildlife clearance is not automatically

mandated."

The memorandum said that the rights granted under Section 3(2), when read with other relevant sections of the Act, are "a statutory entitlement deriving its mandate from the Constitution's Fundamental Rights, not contingent on external clearances unless explicitly stated in the FRA".

Researcher C R Bipoy said a 2020 letter from the environment ministry has been widely used by forest officials to blook basic facilities in forest villages under Section 3(2) of the FRA, despite no formal orders being issued to states. Forest rights experts claim forest villages have long been denied services like schools, roads and health centres that are available in regular revenue villages. Forest fricials of

are available in regular revenue villages. Forest officials of

are available in regular revenue villages. Protest officials due to holds such projects, saying they are not legally allowed or citing forest conservation reasons. As a result, these villages remain some of the most neglected in the country. In many cases, even after the district-level committees approved the projects, forest officials stopped them, triggering protests. In some instances, courts have even issued stay orders based on the 2020 letter.

In February 2019, a suicide bombing targeted a convoy of Indian Security forces in Pulwama in Jammu & Kashmir, resulting in the deaths of 40 soldiers. India's authorities concluded that the attack was orchestrated by Jaish-1-Mohammed (JM).

As a result of the investigation, 19 individuals were charged under relevant provisions of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, including sections related to TF. Among those charged were seven forcign nationals, including the suicide bomber. LEAs also recovered moveable and immovable assets connected to the attack, such as vehicles and terrorist hideouts.

Indian authorities have repeatedly highlighted Pakistan's persistent support for terrorism and its funnelling of multilat-eral funds for arms procurement. India has consistently held that Pakistan has given safe haven to designated terrorists and according to sources, India views that such action by Pakistan warrants that the country be put in the "grey list" of the FATF.
The FATF report flagged that terrorists have been abusing e-

Traded goods can indeed offer disguise to value being transferred from an accomplice to another member of the network. In such scheme, the first actor would purchase items, send them to his accomplice through an EPOM, for the latter to sell items in other jurisdiction and use profit to finance terrorism," the

The FATF in its update on TF risks also highlighted the s used to raise, move, and manage funds and other as-

sets for terrorist financing purposes and said online fund transfers using payment services platform offer less traceability and transparency compared to wire-transfer, making it harder to clearly identify initiators and recipients of transfers. hader to clearly identify initiators and recipients of transfers. Giving a case study on the use of online payment service and VPNs to fund lone actor terrorist act, the FATTe-tied the April 3, 2022. Gorakhanth Temple attempted breach incident wherein an individual, influenced by Islamic State in raq and the Levant (ISIL) ideology, attacked security personnel leading to immediate arrest.

The financial investigation revealed that the individual transferred Rs 669.841 (USD 7.685) via PayPal to foreign countries in support of ISIL, using international third-party transactions and using VPN services to obscure the IP address. He also received Rs 10,323.35 (USD 188) from a foreign source.

Further financial scrutiny uncovered that the accused had made a payment to a VPN provider through his bank ac count to secure these services. A comprehensive analysis of the accused's PayPal transactions, obtained via email, indicated that about 44 international third-party transactions to-talling Rs 669,841 (approximately USD 7,736) had been

talling Rs 669.841 (approximately USD 7,736) had been made to foreign accounts. Additionally, the accused received funds from a foreign account through PayPal. The investigation also uncovered that the accused had sent money to multiple individuals identified as ISII. followers in foreign jurisdictions to support terrorist activities. The to the suspicious nature of these transactions and the potential for TF, PayPal suspended the accused's account, thereby preventing further lilite frund transfers, "the FATF said in the case study as sourced from India's finance ministry.

stry. 'As the offer of online payment services from Fintech com panies grew substantially over the last 10 years, cases of ter-rorists opting for those services can be observed across all contexts, especially as it offers an opportunity to diversify fund-moving channels

tund-moving channels.

"These payment services also appear attractive for terrorist organisations for the low-cost and fast money transfer solutions they offer, with possibility for enhanced opacity on initiators and beneficiaries through pseudonyms or fake accounts," the FATF said.

The FATF said Europol assesses that services are commonly used across all types of terrorist organisations. In cases involving small terrorist cells, FTFs (Foreign Terrorist Fighter), and other individual terrorists, P2P payment services have been used for procurement of military equipment, chemical components, or propaganda materials on ecommerce platforms (EPOMS).

Delegations also report that EORMT (Ethnically or Racially Motivated Terrorism) groups use peer-to-peer payment systems to sell merchandising, items conveying extremist ideolgies (books, music, clothes) to sympathisers, constituting a central source of revenue for those organisations.

'Such online payment services can also be used to convey "Such online payment services can also be used to convey donations to larger organisations, especially in the extent that some payment mechanisms are directly integrated into social networks and content hosting services. In those cases, a single platform can be used to recruit donators, launch a crowdfunding campaign, and proceed to the transfer of funds through an online payment service.

"As it was mentioned regarding credit cards, online payment services offer less traceability and transparency compared to wire-transfer, making it harder to clearly identify initiators and recruitents of transfers," it added.

250 years of American democracy and the machinery of power

and unprecedented is increasingly under lens. Behind the facade of democratic virtue lies a history of conquest, slavery and imperialism; carefully constructed narratives masking brutal truths for 250 years are now crumbling

We have been deceived — again and again - into believing that US democcy was born as a noble product of collective will. The story handed down to us is that George Washington, in a moment of virtuous restraint, rejected Colonel Lewis Nicola's suggestion to crown him king, choosing instead the path of liberty and republicanism. This moment is celebrated as the moral gen esis of American democracy. But 250 the weight of historical reality.

What has been marketed to the world as democracy is, in fact, a meticulously engineered architecture of power: elit ist at home, imperial abroad. The so called "rules-based order" championed by American diplomats is not a codified universalism - it is an ideological cudgel wielded only when convenient a system of selective legality designed to mask naked geopolitical aggression. America's origin myth is steeped not in egalitarianism but in extermination. slavery, and expansionism. The Declaration of Independence, crafted by men who themselves owned human beings, is less a document of freedom than a philosophical smokescreen. The economic engine of the new republic ran on the backs of enslaved Africans - auctioned, whipped, raped, and bred like livestock. The foundational wealth of the United States was extracted not merely through commerce or innova tion, but through racialised brutality institutionalised as law.

Simultaneously, Indigenous nations were decimated by policies so fero cious they now fall under the ambit of enocide. The Trail of Tears, initiated under Andrew Jackson, led to the deaths of thousands during forced removals. The Sand Creek Massacre (1864), the Bear River Massacre (1863), and the slaughter at Wounded Knee (1890) are but a few unambiguous testaments to settler - colonial annihilation. These were not chaotic by-products of war - they were methodical acts of ethnic cleansing. carried out under Government authori ty. The Indian Boarding Schools, operating well into the 20th century, func tioned as laboratories of cultural era sure. The map of US bombings reads like a grim eulo gy for the postcolonial Hiroshima and Nagasaki (1945), Korea (1950-53), Vietnam, Laos, and Cambodia (1964-75), Grenada (1983), Panama (1989), Iraq (1991, 2003), Yugoslavia (1999), Afghanistan (2001-2021), Libya (2011), Syria, Yemen, Somalia, Pakistan - the list is encyclopaedic, the outcomes catastrophic

assaults were not aberrations. They are the sinews of US foreign policy Civilian casualties, mass displacement, decimated infrastructure - these are collateral sacrifices at the altar of American primacy. The 2003 invasion of Iraq, launched under the pretext of non-existent weapons of mass destruc

unravelled an entire region. It was not just a war crime; it was an act of ontological vandalism. Meanwhile, the CIA functioned as the

state's clandestine sword arm-executing assassinations, staging coups, and manipulating foreign Governments with pathological impunity. Operation Ajax in Iran (1953), the assassination of Patrice Lumumba in Congo (1961). the orchestration of Chile's 1973 coup and Salvador Allende's death, the slaughter following Suharto's rise in Indonesia - these are not Cold War footnotes. They are the operational grammar of empire. From Latin America's death squads to Africa's proxy militias, the US exported death in the name of freedom, dissolving democracies while preaching democratic virtue. The façade cracked further on 22 June 2025, when the US military launched the airstrikes on alleged Iranian nuclear sites. Again, no Senate approval. Again, no UN mandate. No evidence presented, no imminent threat substantiated. Just premeditated violence delivered from above, wrapped in the rhetoric of preemption.

These violations are not the exceptions - they are the doctrine. They expose the hollow core of the "rules-based international order" that American officials regurgitate at every diplomatic summit. Where were the rules when the International Atomic Energy Agency's findings were ignored? When do civilians become uncounted corpses? Sovereignty is sacred - until it obstructs US interests. Legality is upheld — until it isn't. Morality espoused - until it becomes inconve-

Antonio Gramsci's concept of cultural hegemony is not an abstraction here. American dominance is sustained not only through bombs and bases but through narratives. The cinematic heroism of soldiers, the pageantry of the 4th of July, the mythologising of the Founding Fathers — all cultivate acquiescence. This is not democracy; it is imperial pedagogy. History is sculpted to erase Indigenous resistance, to sanitise slave rebellions, to omit the

tion, killed hundreds of thousands and bloodied cost of expansion. Power survives by shaping memory.

Domestically, this hegemony manifests as a fortified police state. Urban policing is militarised, racialised, and terminally unaccountable. Surveillance perevery digital Billionaires underwrite elections while voters are purged from the rolls.

Meanwhile, whistleblowers Chelsea Manning and Edward Snowden are criminalised for revealing the very duplicities on which the sys tem runs. Justice is rationed. Dissent i criminalised. The machinery of control is bipartisan. And yet, resistance grows quieter when comfort replaces convicion. US policymakers have long per fected a dual strategy; attracting the brightest minds from other nations through the front door with scholarships and opportunity, while welcoming corrupt elites through the back door, bringing with them vast stolen wealth. This was not a coincidence; it was policy. Intellectual capital is harvested, while accountability is outsourced. Those who manage to benefit regardless of where they come from often learn to stay silent. Silence becomes the currency of survival.

Meanwhile, American officials, often standing in nations hollowed out by these very dynamics, deliver polished speeches about anti-corruption and a 'rules-based order." It is disarming to witness a person speak of justice while actively undermining it, to see a smile accompany the quiet betrayal of their conscience. At 250 years, the United States is not an enlightened republic; it is a paradox on the verge of collapse. It exhorts others

to uphold international law while treat ing treaties as toilet paper. It funds brutal regimes while sermonising about human rights. It cloaks militarism in democracy and calls it liberation.

To participate in this pageantry is to be complicit. To swallow the official myths is to ingest poison disguised as principle. American democracy, if it is to mean anything, must be exhumed, dismantled, and reimagined - not venerated as sacred scripture, but interro gated as a living contradiction.
